A pious priest, denouncing the opinions of Wickliffe, teaching that dissent and heresy would assuredly lead to damnation, he was yet well aware that the return of the leaders of religion to their early discipline, was the only chance left for restoring orthodoxy. His name was John Audalay or Awdlay.
