FID. DEF. (or F.D.) = Defender of the Faith

DEI GRATIA (or D.G.) = By the grace of God

REG. = Regina = Queen

REX = King

BRITT. OMN. REX = King of all the Britains

(not used after 1954)

IND. IMP. = Empress or Emperor of India

(not used after 1948)

A guide to old English money

(used until 1971)

£1 = 20 shillings. 1 shilling = 12 pennies. So £1 = 240 pennies.

1 guinea = £1 1s 0d

£1 = 20 shillings (written as 20s or 20/-)

1 shilling = 12 pennies (written as 1s or 1/-)

1 florin = 2 shillings (written as 2s or 2/-)

1 crown = 5 shillings

half a crown = 2 shillings and sixpence (written as 2/6)

1 penny was written as 1d

a tickey = 3 pennies (3d), also called a threepenny bit

a half-penny (ha'penny) = half a penny

a farthing = quarter of a penny (4 farthings = 1d)
